**Foreign minister says NATO member will establish military, intelligence system**

Turkey and Russia will establish a joint military, intelligence and diplomacy mechanism, Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu said Wednesday. Speaking at Anadolu Agency's Editors' Desk, Cavusoglu said the previous

**US racial wealth gap to last decades, study finds**

It will take decades for black and Latino families to accumulate the same amount of wealth white families currently have, a new study revealed. On average, a black family needs 228 years and a Latino family needs 84 years to reach the same wealth as a white family, according to a joint report by the Corporation for Enterprise Development and the Institute for Policy Studies (IPS). ## Turkey denies 'shift of axis' in Erdogan's Russia visit

A Turkish pivot towards Moscow was dismissed by EU Affairs Minister Omer Celik in the wake of President Recep Tayyip Erdogan's meeting with his Russian counterpart on Tuesday. Celik, who is responsible for Turkey's long-running EU accession bid, made his remarks after several commentators

claimed Erdogan's meeting with Vladimir Putin in St. Petersburg -- the first since Turkey shot down a Russian warplane last November -- marked a "shift of axis" in Ankara's foreign policy. ## European countries will move against FETO: Think-tank

European countries will mobilize against the Fetullah Terrorist Organization (FETO) for the sake of relations between Turkey and the European Union, predicted the head of a prominent think-tank Wednesday. In an interview with Anadolu Agency, Samuel Doveri Vesterbye, head of the Brussels-based European Neighbourhood Council, cited British Ambassa-

dor to Turkey Richard Moore pledging that the U.K. will cooperate with Turkey if it provides evidence of FETO's activities in the U.K. Vesterbye said Moore's statement is a very positive step because it shows that there will be cooperation with Turkey in the future. ## Europe needs gas and Turkey is key



Europe could become more dependent on Turkey in the future, either as a transit or a trading hub for natural gas supplies to Europe, said Gareth Jenkins, a senior fellow with the Central Asia-Caucasus Institute and Silk Road Studies Program on Wednesday. "Both Turkey and Europe are aware of the need to diversify their energy suppliers, particularly when it comes to natural gas -- which, of

course, is a lot less flexible than oil," Jenkins told Anadolu Agency. He added that for the future, Turkey seems to have more potential options of new supplies, not only from the Caucasus and Central Asia but also from Iraq and the eastern Mediterranean. "As things stand, European countries -- and particularly countries such as Germany -- don't have the same number of options. >>MORE DETAILS
